

Conserved Riverfront Land Protects Forests, Waterways, and Habitat

Earlier this year Hilltown Land Trust completed conservation of twenty acres of forested land along the West Branch of the Mill River in Williamsburg.

Protecting land around waterways is crucial to the health of the river, since the land acts as a buffer against erosion, pollution, and floods. Conserving this land helps maintain adequate tree and plant cover for the species that live and breed in the stream habitat.

This property includes 1,400 feet of river frontage in a scenic section of the river upstream from Devil's Den. It includes important habitat for native species, including the Northern Spring Salamander and a dragonfly species called the Ocellated Darner, a species of special concern in Massachusetts.




Conserving forestland in this area is one way to make a critical contribution to combating climate change.

The conserved land is land-locked—meaning it has no road frontage—and is designated "forever wild," creating a place where the forest can mature naturally, with minimal management, and remain largely undisturbed by human activities.

The project came about after the settlement in 2021 of a lawsuit resulting from a violation of federal stormwater requirements by Dynamic Energy Solutions. The company failed to follow state and federal regulations meant to protect wetlands when they built their solar array uphill

from the river. A storm in 2019 caused massive runoff from the project site that damaged forests and polluted the Mill River.

According to the 2022 Climate Change Assessment produced by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the risk of damage caused by flooding and erosion in The Hilltowns will increase significantly over the course of this century. Conserving forestland in this area is one way to make a critical contribution to combating climate change.



We collaborated on this project with our partners at Kestrel Land Trust, who will hold a conservation restriction on the property while HLT holds the title. Combined, the measures help ensure that the land will be protected for conservation purposes in perpetuity. By joining forces with partner organizations and our members, together we can have a bigger impact on the beautiful landscape in this region.

Every year, Hilltown Land Trust's Community Engagement Coordinator helps publicize and lead the All Out Adventure (AOA) senior snowshoeing programs at the DAR State Forest as part of a long-standing partnership. HLT is happy to support the work of our partners at AOA, who create outdoor experiences for people of all abilities.

On a winter morning in Goshen, a group of seniors is seated around a registration table. The program leaders and I are buzzing back and forth, tying on ice grippers and snowshoes in preparation for trekking snow-covered trails. The seniors are here for the Senior Snowshoe walks, a weekly program that

gives seniors a way to stay active and socialize throughout the winter.

After a brief round of introductions, we are off, tramping across the shore of Upper Highland Lake before heading into the woods on a universal access trail. We trace the lake shore and deep hemlock forests, stopping to notice the differences between yellow, white, and black birch tree bark. Ice fishers dot the surface of the thick lake ice.

One snowshoer and I chat about our rescue cats as other participants around us catch up. These hikes give us good exercise and are also a powerful social tonic. For many seniors in the area, the Senior Snowshoe walks are what gets them moving and meeting people during the winter months.

"One of the things I love about the program is that I can go with a group. At my age, I don't have any friends that are physically able to go out with me and do this type of activity. I wouldn't go alone in case I fell or ran into a problem," participant Ruth Alice tells me.

Rounding the bend in the snow-covered woods road, we all return to the registration area to remove borrowed snowshoes and set them aside for the next group arriving at noon. Friends and new faces part ways, calling out to each other, "See you next week!"
